One thing that is commonly associated with Halloween is its jack-o-lanterns. With jack-o-lanterns, they end up rotting and you have to throw them away at the end of the season. Not this one though! This is a fun festive jack-o-lantern you can

You will need:

- Clear jar with lid
- Glitter
- Water
- Black paper or felt
- Scissors

- Orange paint
- Teaspoon
- Corn syrup
- Piece of cork or stick
- Glue/tape

Instructions:

- 1. Paint the lid of the clear jar orange. Let it dry.
- 2. Fill the bottle or jar about halfway with corn syrup.




