








To help get you into the Thanksgiving spirit start by making these cute paper pumpkins! These pumpkins are fun craft to make and will help you get in the mood for the season.

You will need:

- Color or patterned paper (full sheets)
- Paper trimmer (or a ruler and scissors)
- Double Sided tape
- Hot glue and glue gun
- Sticks
- Twine
- Scissors





Instructions:

- 1. Cut each piece of paper vertically into 1.5 inch wide strips.
- Then cut two strips to 7 inches long, two 9 inches and keep the remaining two at 11 inches long. (You need two pieces of paper for one pumpkin. Each pumpkin will need two 7 inch , four 9 inch and four 11 inch strips.)
- 3. Fold each piece into accordion strips.
- 4. Tape the *two sets* with the same lengths together with double sided tape the form a circle. You will end up with one circle with the 7 inch, two with the 9 inch, and two with the 11 inch.
- 5. Create a medallion with the circles by placing a small dab of hot glue in the center and then hold it until dry.
- 6. Next, glue each medallion together by starting with the 7 inch on top, then the 9, then the 11, then the other 11, and then other 9 on the bottom.
- 7. Hot glue a stick, paper leaves, and twine on the top of your pumpkin.

Now you have your very own paper pumpkin!

For other holidays you can just change up the color of the paper and create these for any season!

Hello IHM! I interviewed the one and only new teacher (but not new to the school), Mr. Corbett, to learn all about our annual spaghetti dinner.

My first question was: **How much spaghetti?** And you may not believe his answer but 100 lbs of spaghetti! I know, I was just as shocked as you, but it does make sense for serving over 500 people!

Next I asked: **How long does it take to make it?** And he had two different answers.

"It all depends on how the spaghetti dinner is set up. Pre-COVID, when we still served all of the food in the gymnasium, we would par-cook the spaghetti the night before and then cook all of the sauce and meatballs the day of. Now that COVID has forced us into a carry-out model, we cook everything the day of the event. That means spaghetti, sauce, meatballs, and salad are all cooked and packaged on the day of the event. We will be working from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Saturday".
